On the last cruise I took -- on Princess -- there was a business center where you could pay for internet time to check email. Of course, it's not confidential. On the same cruise the WiFi was just marginal in the cabin...and it made the computer almost unusable.

I always take a laptop/netbook when I go on a cruise, to keep tabs on my email.

I was on a cruise on Royal Caribbean just a few weeks ago. The ship I was on (Liberty of the Seas) had wifi throughout the ship, but you have to pay. There is a per minute charge (\$.60 if I recall correctly) and they have pay in advance options that drop the price a bit - like \$55 for 100 minutes. Other Royal Caribbean ships only had wifi available in certain spots, so you had to go to the library or a café to check email. On Liberty I could check email from the cabin. Be prepared - my experience is that the internet is slow on the ship, so you end up spending more time than you think. My most recent cruise was a five day cruise and my internet cost was about \$60.00, and I was using it only to check and respond to emails.

I brought a netbook, which fit in the safe in the cabin. A tablet probably would also fit in the safe. The safes in the cabins seem to be the same size that you would find in a hotel room.

I cruise quite often. I'm a solo practitioner and since I have been unable to convince my clients that they should pay me not to work on their cases, I have to work while on vacation. I bring my laptop.

My secretary scans everything that comes into the office and puts it into a file on dropbox (she used to email me the scans but with dropbox that became unnecessary). I purchase a 150 - 200 minute plan on the ship in order to get the best rate and then use it to check email, and dropbox (and facebook, lol). Then I can create emails back to my secretary telling her what, if anything, needs to be done. Clients also send me emails if they have any questions while I'm gone.

I check my emails when I'm sitting on my balcony in the morning with coffee, or while sitting on my balcony in the sun with a frozen concoction or lazing around the cabin with the balcony door open late at night before going to bed. (Balcony is key here - never get a cabin without a balcony!!!)

Anyway, this works for me, allows me to do some billing, to make sure nothing is going on that needs immediate attention, and gives me peace of mind that my firm hasn't blown up while I cruise the Caribbean.
