

## Logging off Samsung Galaxy Phone

I have a Samsung Galaxy phone. I want to log off my phone so texts and Messenger messages aren't accessible to anyone who has my phone. I can't find where to log off, and when I Googled "How to log off Samsung Galaxy"

the only options that came up were logging off apps individually--Gmail, or Facebook, or Skype, not logging off the phone. I never do this and I'm sure I'm missing something, since without the ability to log off I have text messages sitting there, accessible to anyone.

I have an S5, and I'm not sure how you would accomplish this. Granted, I use a third-party app for text messages (Handcent SMS, now called Next SMS I think) that allows you to password protect your inbox. You may need to do that. As far as Messenger, if you're talking about Facebook Messenger, I imagine you can set it so that it doesn't remember your password and you have to enter your password each time you log into it. I don't use Facebook Messenger, so that may not be the solution.

I don't believe you can log off the text messages because those come from the carrier and, generally, the carrier's app, but your carrier may have protections on them. In my text message settings I have a selection to disconnect my device as well as to unsubscribe. This only stops the syncing of messages to the phone and does not delete the messages already there (Verizon)

I don't use FB messenger, so I have to log in via the web browser when I want to check those

Private mode seems to only work on things like pictures or documents, not apps or messages

If you swipe down from the very top of the screen, there will be a gear icon on the top right. That is for settings. If you go into that, not very far down you will see "Lock screen". Tap on that icon and it will give you options for locking your phone -- typically a numerical PIN, a 'normal' password, a swipe pattern, or a fingerprint scan.

Erin is correct. The fingerprint scan is very sensitive. Your finger cannot be wet, moist, cold, wrinkles, or in any condition where your prints may not be the same as when you scanned your print for use in the first place.
