I use a couple of the low end Olympus recorders (ws-100). I find the quality excellent even when placed in the middle of a conference table to capture multiple voices. There are fancier models and you just have to choose your price point.

If you're going to do dictation, then you'll need a slide switch model (\$\$\$). If you'll just be using it to capture depos and such, then skip the slide switch. The slide switch technology adds greatly to the price.

On the Olympus models I have, they don't use the proprietary format and you can transfer the files easily. And I really like that the USB plug is incorporated into the body of the device.
